Background to the recordings

Teop is an Oceanic language of the Nehan-North Bougainville network of the North-West Solomonic group of the Meso-Melanesian cluster (Ross 1988). Accurate figures for the number of speakers are difficult to ascertain; figures from the last decade range from 5,000 to 10,000. The island of Bougainville was torn by a civil war which lasted from 1989 to 1998 and resulted in an estimated 18,000 to 20,000 casualties, with a devastating effect on the speech population. Factors like marriage outside of the Teop speech community, the pressure of neighbouring languages, the growing influence of Tok Pisin as a lingua franca, and the use of English in education all contribute making Teop a highly endangered language.

The Teop texts were recorded by Ulrike Mosel and Enoch Horai Magum during the course of a DOBES language documentation project (principal investigator: Ulrike Mosel) funded by the Volkswagen-Stiftung (grant no. II 77 973). A sketch grammar of Teop (Mosel & Thiesen 2007) and additional materials are available on the DOBES website.¹
